WELCOME TO THE 25TH ANNUAL NICKEL INDEPENDENT FILM FESTIVAL

The genuine honour of extending this greeting to you has been accorded to me on this milestone occasion, due to an initial invitation to play a supporting role in the very first Nickel. To my continued surprise and

honour I have been recast every year since, tasked with sorting through the numerous submissions to the festival, and helping craft the final line-up. In 2005, when it became clear that mine was to be a recurring role, the Board of Directors asked me to join their ranks, usually chairing what is now called the Programming Committee. Frankly, as I reflect on those many years, I still don't know what to make of it all.

There's a nagging dissection of the fictional Mr. Gump's box of chocolates analogy that's bouncing around my head, but it's way too lengthy to get into here. Unfortunately, so is the list of people, films and moments deserving of acknowledgement and thanks. What I can say, however, is that if I look back on where I'd be if I hadn't accepted that initial invitation, it leads me to what I think is a more important consideration. I firmly believe that none of my innumerable roads not taken along the way would have made me who I am, right here, right now. To clarify, I was hardly a rogue to begin with, nor did I get anywhere close to the short list for the papacy, either. Still, I think that regularly encountering so many diverse perspectives brought by countless films from people and places around the globe, I've grown into a better human being than I would have otherwise. I feel truly blessed, am endlessly grateful for the opportunity, and I sincerely hope that you find yourself rewarded, in some little way, by your Nickel experience.

If this is your first visit with us, we hope that you find that while we are a regional film festival, devoted to showcasing local productions, our primary concern is that you have a grand night out. And if you're a repeat guest, welcome back. It's great to have you again.

This year is one of many happy returns here at the Nickel, as most of our local films, and a few of those from outside the province, are works from folk who have screened with us previously. Our three feature films arrive courtesy of festival alumni. Kenneth J. Harvey returns with another engaging documentary film, **The Bear Inside a Whale**; our own Devin Shears, renowned during the pandemic for his on-line Nickel interviews from within his mountain chalet, comes home with his endearing **Cherub**; and Nik Sexton's back with his deadly motion picture, **Skeet**.

After a brief hiatus, longtime contributor, CNA's Animation Program's Graduating Class are once again mining chuckles, this time with **Fistful of Water**. Ian Foster turns his hand to satire this year, with **Hang in There!**, surprisingly shot on a phone, while on the other end of the technical spectrum, Stephen L. Bonnell's 16mm journey brings us his most avantgarde work to date, **Change in Time**. Roger Gallant's time-lapse motion picture, **Abstract Skies**, is an engaging follow-up to his offering last year, and Shan Leigh Pomeroy delivers yet another playful stopmotion creation, **Transmission**.

Elizabeth Hicks further explores the tumult of adolescence in I Need to Get This off My Chest, while Stacey Gardner's 73 Seconds, adapted from one of her poems, offers another take on this critical point in life. Bridgett A. Ricketts and Michelle Clements, on the other hand, present us with the challenge of parents whose adult children refuse to grow up, with their mock documentary, This Hour Has 5 Minutes. Prolific Vaida Nairn has also chosen to co-direct, here with Daniel Griffin, an intimate portrait of a local performance artist in Above Above, Below Below. Nicola Hawkins, however, wrangles a more populated cast, boatloads of sheep, in her Ba Baa Shangri La.

Stephen Cadigan doesn't just give us another incarnation of **Berries for Sale**, but our very first local superhero film, **Northerner**. Arriving as we screen our 20th horror show screening, it gives us the perfect opportunity to expand our after dark line-up with an action/thriller screening, and thanks to Nickel newcomer Alexa Jane Jerrett's otherworldly **Bedlamer**, we've also added a show of mystical/ supernatural films. Serendipity indeed.

We have high hopes for other future alumni. Duncan Major's heartfelt animated film, Imprint, is sure to leave a lasting impression, and Ryan Patrick McDonald's surreal **Elapse** is a solid component of our horror I think that regularly encountering so many diverse perspectives brought by countless films from people and places around the globe, I've grown into a better human being than I would have otherwise. I feel truly blessed, am endlessly grateful for the opportunity, and I sincerely hope that you find yourself rewarded, in some little way, by your Nickel experience. show on Thursday. Stephen Coombs, regularly seen on screen in film challenge entries, steps behind the camera to bring us **Kneaded**, and a whole crew of film challenge participants have struck out on their own to produce **Any Mummers 'Lowed In??**.

And before your thoughts go to "what else could I want, jam on it?" we have that too. Not only do we have a big box of cinematic confections from across the country and around the globe, but after all this and our closing night party on Saturday, we've jammed in a science fiction film challenge screening on Sunday.

Still, we might have forgotten something in our celebratory exuberance while preparing to launch The Nickel's 25th season. The one thing that has remained foremost in our sights, however, is the reason why the festival came to being in the first place: you, the viewer. What's the value of a film, local or otherwise, if no one sees it as it's meant to be, projected onto a big screen? Thank you so much for stepping into this vital role of the process. Whether you're a current or (fingers crossed) future Nickel audience alumnus, we are so very grateful that you've chosen to join us to share in a little bit of movie magic. Enjoy.

FEATURE FILM • Q&A WITH CHERUB DIRECTOR DEVIN SHEARS TO FOLLOW

DIRECTOR: DEVIN SHEARS • NL/ONTARIO • 75 MINUTES

Told almost entirely without dialogue, this meditative character study follows Benjamin Turnbull as Harvey, a straight, fat man who discovers an opportunity to build new confidence in himself and his body when he learns about the chub subculture in the LGBTQ community and decides to submit a photograph of himself to a magazine's "Cherub of the Month" contest. This is Newfoundland and Labrador director Devin Shears' first feature as his Master's thesis in the Film Studies program at York University. Made with a budget of just \$10,000, the film premiered at the 2024 Vancouver International Film Festival, was screened in the National Competition at the 2024 Festival du nouveau cinéma, and has been garnering glowing reviews at screenings worldwide.

WITH SHORT FILM IN THE SHADOW **OF THE CYPRESS**

Living in a house by the sea with his daughter, a former captain haunted by past trauma leads a tough and secluded life. This beautiful Iranian film took home the Oscar for Best Animated Short Film at the 2025 Academy Awards.

Like ink on paper, chance encounters can leave a lasting imprint. At 13, Duncan Major met artist Tara Bryan and discovered a shared passion for letterpress printing that continues to shape his life and work as a St. John's artist, poet, and designer. In Tara's memory, Duncan created Imprint, a poetic animated film that serves as a heartfelt tribute to his mentor. Using the letterpress and craft material she passed down to him, Imprint brings hand-printed art to life with vibrant

animation, evocative imagery and a beautifully designed soundscape. A beautifully animated celebration of how the relationships we build echo outward and endure across time.

DEAR DAD

DIRECTOR: BURTON ROCKS -USA - 10 MINUTES In this sweet, poignant and tender film, 91 year old Dr. Lawrence Rocks writes a letter to his deceased father as a way of explaining to his own son that memories are more important than objects. A testament to the love between a father and son across generations.

73 SECONDS

DIRECTOR: STACY GARDNER • NL • 9 MINUTES It's 1986 and 7 grade

student Shannon Crane means to be bound for a future she cannot know on a day filled with possibility and hope. Shannon reckons with the ordinary calamity of being herself after an incident of being bullied and the extraordinary catastrophic event of the Space Challenger disaster. A coming of age story by emerging St. John's filmmaker Stacy Gardner.



Stan Hill Jr. is a Haudenosaunee artist living in Miawpukek First Nation Reserve, Conne River, Newfoundland. In The Bear Inside a Whale, he and his family discuss racism, identity, religion, creation and art, along with the cultural extinction of the Beothuk of Newfoundland. Throughout the film, we follow Stan carving a bear out of a whale vertebra. And we visit The Rooms (museum) in St. John's, Newfoundland, where Stan talks about viewing and reclaiming Indigenous artefacts.

After his release from prison, Billy Skinner returns to his St. John's neighbourhood to discover a transformed community—what was once a predominantly white working-class area is now home to Syrian refugee families. As Billy navigates his reintegration into society, he must confront not only his own demons and addiction struggles but also the evolving cultural landscape of his hometown. He forms an unlikely friendship with Mohamed, a Syrian refugee who is also learning to rebuild his life in unfamiliar surroundings.

Director Nik Sexton delivers unflinching social realism in this feature, exploring themes of displacement, belonging, and redemption against St. John's stark and beautiful backdrop. Shot in black and white, Skeet examines the universal experience of feeling like an outsider—whether you're an ex-convict trying to rebuild your life or a refugee family starting over in an unfamiliar place.

Raw and authentic in its portrayal of contemporary life in the city, the film tackles the province's ongoing addiction crisis while weaving a story about human connection that transcends cultural boundaries.


